Common Signs & Symptoms of Autism

- Little or no eye contact
- Late talking or no speech
- Repeating words or phrases.
- Limited gestures (pointing, waving).
- Prefers to play alone or has trouble playing with others.
- Difficulty understanding facial expressions or social cues.
- Repetitive movements (hand-flapping, rocking).
- Very strong interest in certain objects or topics.
- Needs routines and gets upset with changes.
- Sensitive to sounds, lights, or textures.
- Focuses on parts of toys or moving objects.



What is Autism?

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a developmental condition that affects how a child learns, communicates, plays, and interacts with others.

Every child with autism is different. Signs can be mild or more noticeable. Early support can make a big difference.



Why is Early Screening Important?

Early screening helps children get support sooner. This improves:

- ✓ Communication
- ✓ Social skills
- ✓ Behavior
- ✓ School readiness
- ✓ Long-term independence

Screenings can be done by a pediatrician or early childhood provider.

When Should You Seek an Evaluation?

Trust your instincts—if something feels off, it's okay to ask for help at any age. You may want to seek an evaluation if:

- Your child loses skills they already learned (such as words or social skills).
- Your child is not meeting age-expected milestones, like talking, walking, or playing.
- Your child seems very frustrated, has frequent meltdowns, or struggles to communicate.
- A teacher, doctor, or childcare provider shares concerns.

If you suspect your child has any of these symptoms, speak to your health care providers
